LIFE CRUSHED OUT

BENEATH THE WHEELS OF A HEAVY LOCOMOTIVE.

Fatal Accident Befalls Charles Wilhelm, a Helper at the B. & O. Round House.

Charles Wilhelm, a helper at the B. & O. roundhouse, below the Fourth street viaduct, received injuries Sunday morning while engaged at his work, which proved fatal before the day closed.

Wilhelm was engaged in cleaning the ash pit of engine No. 750, and was climbing from under the huge piece of iron and steel, when the hostler, in the cab of the engine, started to back it. One of the large driving wheels caught Wilhelm near the right hip, and crushed that member almost from the body.

The patrol wagon was hastily summoned and Wilhelm was taken to St. Francis hospital. Here an examination showed that the injuries were fatal, and no attempt at operation was made by the physicians. Wilhelm lingered along until about 4:30 o'clock, when death intervened and ended his sufferings.

An investigation of the accident shows that the hostler, who backed the engine, John R. Jenkins, had called to Wilhelm before he started it, and that the response, "all right," had come from Wilhelm. Mike Cosgrue, the engineer of the engine, was in the cab at the time, and according to reports at the police station of the investigation, corroborates the statement of Jenkins. The latter is almost overcome over the result of the accident.

Wilhelm was 27 years of age, and resided with his father at 1051 Devels

The two men, Swartz and Irwin, were on the top floor of the building about 6 o'clock in the evening. Swartz, who is said to have been drinking, displayed a revolver. When Irwin came around the corner he struck Swartz, who turned and fired point blank at him. The bullet struck his left shoulder, inflicting a bad flesh wound, but nothing serious.
